1.0 What's Happening Week 11?

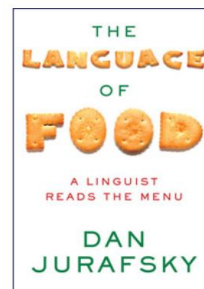
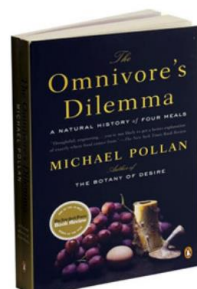
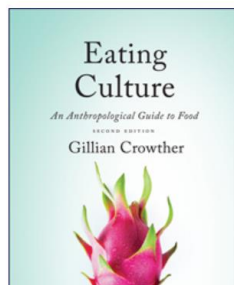
